DETAILED WORK PROGRAMME Project E-COSMOS European Commuters for Sustainable Mobility Strategies Call for proposals VP/2010/001

1. Short summary of the project

The object of the project E-COSMOS is to study, quantify and define proceedings in favour of socially and environmentally sustainable mobility regarding the workers of the European Union. Therefore, it is about mobility that facilitates the access of these collectives to their workplaces by promoting the use of public transport, less polluting vehicles and the rational use of the private car, at the same time as introducing measures that allow their economic costs to be quantified for both workers and employers and society in general.

The way workers travel to their workplaces has suffered a radical change in recent years. The relocation of industries and productive activity centres to the outskirts of cities began a process of segregating the land use that has culminated in the implantation of many industrial estates surrounding the metropolis (often far from urban centres).

This scenario implies on one hand, an increase of the time used to travel from home to the workplace, which affects the well-being of the population and reduces leisure and family time. On the other hand it implies an increase in the use of the private cars to go to work. Such a mobility model involves inevitable environmental, social and economic impacts that affect society as a whole and specifically the well-being and quality of life of many workers.

This mobility model has three types of impact:

- Social impact: reduction of citizens' well-being and a decrease in time dedicated to oneself and/or to the family, labour exclusion of workers who do not have driving license, especially women and non-EU migrant workers, and effects on the health and safety caused by accidents en route to work and the increase of pulmonary diseases due to higher levels of pollution.
- Economic impact, caused by the loss of competitiveness and the individual and collective costs of mobility. When we speak of costs we refer to both direct and indirect costs that influence individual, family and collective economy of each country. No one accepts the responsibility for these costs, which have an impact on the quality of life of citizens: gas emissions, climatic change, noise, effects of road accidents, loss of time, congestion, etc. These costs may be evaluated in terms of GDP and many of them also end up affecting companies.
- Environmental impact: transport consumes around 40% of primary energy in industrialized countries. Three quarters of Europe's energy consumption corresponds to mobility by road and more than half of this consumption occurs in urban areas in journeys of less than 6 Km. The transport sector has become at the same time one of the main emitters of polluting compounds in the world and one of the main causes of the greenhouse effect. Acting on this is acting on climate change.

With this scenario the global objective of the project is to achieve the definition of new patterns of mobility to improve the access of workers to their workplaces by increasing the use of public transport, the use of less polluting vehicles and the rational use of private cars, and by introducing measures that allow us to quantify the economic costs for workers, employers and society in general. These patterns and proposals will be presented by the European Trade Union Confederation (ETUC) to the European Commission for the drawing up of a future European Directive on Sustainable Mobility to workplaces.

This target entails the articulation of several specific objectives:

- 1) Study how workers travel from their homes to their workplaces in four European countries, which are among the most economically dynamic regions in the EU.
- 2) Study the different policies implemented in four European regions to promote sustainable mobility to workplaces, reduce negative environmental effects, social exclusion and lack of competitiveness; and prioritise the most effective ones.
- 3) Exchange experiences with trade union representatives and employers from the regions where the cooperation shall be established.
- 4) Design a set of proposals directed at disseminating the objectives and actions in favour of sustainable mobility between workers, employers and government authorities at European level.
- 5) Suggest some general guidelines of what a European policy in favour of sustainable mobility should be.

2. Detailed description of the work programme

2.1. Phases of the project

The project will be developed in two phases or stages that will be described below. Each of these phases includes a series of activities that will be explained in detail in the following section and are included in the timetable at the end of this chapter.

1° PHASE:

The first phase includes the writing and preparation of the **comparative study** of mobility problems for commuters in Belgium, Germany, Italy and Spain, and of public policies to promote sustainable mobility.

Three workshops will be held in Spain in order to detail the tasks of the project and to discuss and agree upon a methodology of the study and the draft versions. Site visits will be included in each workshop to exchange experiences and learn about successful practices on sustainable mobility in Spain.

Three technical visits will be carried out to the three countries participating in this project: Belgium, Germany and Italy. The aim of the visits is to approach the reality in each country in terms of mobility management and to exchange experiences.

In the end of this phase, the final version of the comparative study will be validated with the partners, translated and published both in English and Spanish language.

2° PHASE:

During the second phase of the project the public presentation and dissemination of the study and its results will be accomplished.

A Final Conference will be held in Madrid with the active participation of all the partner organisations as lecturers. In this conference the conclusions of the comparative study will be presented to trade unions, public institutions and authorities.

The project and the study will be also disseminated through partners' websites. Finally, the results and conclusions of the project will be presented to the national authorities and to the European Trade Union Confederation and through it to the European Commission.

- Collect data and interview key informants for the comparative study.
- Exchange experiences and learn about different successful practices on sustainable mobility in each country.

In order to achieve a comprehensive survey of mobility patterns and new proposals on mobility, all partners will collect the necessary information prior to the visit:

- Detailed description of different mobility problems for commuters in each country, considering environmental issues and social exclusion.
- Detailed description of the general legal framework of mobility as well as mobility policies in each country.
- Role and experience of trade unions in each country, specifying if there are federation or sector agreements with employers.

Comparative study

It will be supervised by CCOO with the support of ISTAS, CGIL, ABVV and ACE, and an external expert.

It will be carried out between November 2010 and August 2011.

The objectives of this study are:

- Study how workers travel from their homes to their workplaces in four European countries, which are characterised by being among the most economically dynamic regions in the EU.
- Study the different policies that are carried out in four European regions in order to favour sustainable mobility in the workplace that reduces negative environmental effects, social exclusion and competitiveness, giving priority to those that are the most effective.
- Define some guidelines to support trade union and employers action in favour of sustainable and safe access to workplaces.
- Suggest some general guidelines of what a European policy in favour of sustainable mobility should be.

The study will be published in English and Spanish in September 2011. The publication format will be an A4 booklet with covers printed in four colours and pages printed in two colours. Number of copies: 75 in English, 200 in Spanish.

Final Conference

Madrid, 24 October 2011.

It will be organised by CCOO and ISTAS, with the participation of representatives of CGIL, ABVV and ACE.
